As I write for the newsletter this month, I am warmly nuzzled in my desk chair at the congregation's office. Over the last year it has transformed from a stiff office chair to a comfortable embrace conforming to the landscape (hills and valleys no doubt!) of my body. It feels like home after a summer of travel. Regina, our Congregational Administrator, is just outside my door. Seeing her, listening to her, feeling her presence feels like home. I often sit alone in our sanctuary to reflect, process, to think, and to pray. Though I'm alone. I can feel the energy of "us" in the room and this guides my thoughts. It feels like home.

Richard and I frequently comment to one another that we've been members and leaders of many congregations, but none like All Faiths. We feel held by the congregation. That is, we feel cheered on, supported, and encouraged. I hope we all feel this way.

Last month we said goodbye to two of our members that died. I still feel their loss. I notice that they aren't sitting in their usual places on Sunday mornings. I still find myself wondering how they are doing and reaching for the phone. Change. We continue to move on. Such is congregational life. Cycles, circles, and coming along.

This is why it is so important to create a home at All Faiths and in Fort Myers. No matter our losses, no matter our disappointments, no matter our joys, no matter our celebrations-- we are home. Because we are UII's we extend an invitation to create community within our congregational life, an invitation to partner with organizations that share our values, and welcome people searching for liberal religion. This invitation makes us facilitators. As facilitators, we enable and teach people and organizations to create the world we dream about by inviting them to walk and live with us.

Sharing our resources, sharing our space, and sharing our pulpit makes us leaders in the community. It holds us accountable to the principles that guide our lives. I know when I feel frustrated with typical day to day complications by offering this invitation I need to step back from my inward thinking and see the big picture. That is, I step away from my feelings of scarcity, my need to guard the congregation and its space, and my inward

thinking.

The truth is we are a healthy congregation with all it needs to lead, teach, and nurture progressive people, ideas, and organizations. We have all we need to grow the liberal voice in Southwest Florida. It is time for us to offer the invitation to people and partners. We will only grow deeper in our UU faith and identity. We are strong, smart and hold gifts our community is thirsty for. Let us offer that invitation and create home.

The recycling bin not only is composting yard waste, but will become a science fair project for Children's Religious Education as they look at how long it takes to compost plant-based products.

The cloth napkins in the kitchen and cloth towels in the bathroom have been a tremendous success. Use of paper is down! Our *Earth Sunday* provided information on the Conservation 20/20 efforts and action towards that effort in the form of letters to the county commissioners. Water bottle sales continue. TOGETHER ON THE JOURNEY

Each month the newsletter will profile an All Faiths' veteran and/or new member. This month we feature Barbara Guidotti and Marge and Bob DiGalbo.

Barbara Guidotti Member Since January 2018



Barbara Guidotti joined our congregation in January 2018 after attending sporadically since 2010 when she moved to Fort Myers to be near one of her daughters. Before moving to Florida, she had been active in a Unitarian congregation in Bangor, Maine.

Barb spent most of her youth in California; her father taught creative writing at Chico State College. After graduating from Pomona College, she married and had two daughters and one

son, who lives in Sweden. Both daughters live in Florida. Barb was widowed in 2005.

She and her husband, who was a geology professor, lived in Madison, Wisconsin for 12 years before joining the faculty at the University of Maine in Orono. Before retiring, she was the head teacher of the Child Study Center, which was part of the psychology department. As she describes it, she was basically a pre-school teacher in a university setting.

When her oldest child was in preschool, Barb began writing children's stories and has published 13 books. Twelve of them feature a creature called a "Wallaboo," which embodies the spirit of childhood, the belief that anything and everything is possible. She drew on her observations of her own children and the many pre-schoolers she taught throughout her career to present the world from a child's viewpoint. (The books are available at Barnes & Noble and through Amazon.)

Nature is one of her passions. Her husband Charles, an avid birder, was an early influence. At present, her interests have led her to volunteer at J.N. "Ding" Darling Nature Center. Once a week, she walks the beach looking for turtle nests. Lately, that has been done despite red tide's creating less than ideal conditions. One thing that attracted her to All Faiths was the many congregants who are concerned about the environment.

Marjory and Bob DiGalbo Member Since February 2018



Marge and Bob DiGalbo moved to this area to be close to Marge's sister June who was losing her battle with pancreatic cancer. (June passed away in May last year.)

Although pleased with Florida, both Bob and Marge have

missed their UU home in Hartford, Connecticut. It was larger for one thing, but they found that All Faiths has the strong spirit of community they were seeking. They were welcomed into our congregation in February.

Marge was born into a Jewish family with a strong religious tradition. Her great-grandfather founded the first Reform Temple in Connecticut. (Regina: The denominations in Judaism are Orthodox, Reconstructionist, Conservative and Reform). Bob was raised in a Catholic family. When the two decided to marry, they first visited a priest, who informed them that Marge would have to agree to raise any children Catholic. When they visited the rabbi, he told them that he would not marry them unless Bob converted to Judaism. Frustrated, they finally consulted a UU minister. They were stunned and happy to hear him immediately ask, "How can we be of help to you both?" They had found their "home" and were active participants in the West Hartford UU congregation for more than 43 years.

Their children received their religious education in that church. Marge found that her Jewish heritage was honored, not just accepted. Her father was invited to perform their UU congregation's first Seder, an event that became an annual tradition. Bob became very involved as a leader in the congregation's Boy Scout program. Both of their sons received the UU Boy Scout Service Award, and Bob was honored as a UU Boy Scout leader.

Bob graduated from a technical high school in Hartford and worked for Pratt Whitney for 43 years, where he served as head of a plant maintenance department. Marge first earned an Associate's Degree in nursing and later earned her BSN. She worked for a hospital, then in hospice care and later as a manager for the Visiting Nurse Association. She returned to the hospital setting as a case manage for its home care service. She became concerned about some insurance companies' denials of payment, but through her efforts, the hospital was able to recover an additional \$2 million annually.

Bob and Marge both retired at 62. Although their permanent home is now in Florida, they still return to their northern home in the summer. They are welcomed by their son, who is buying the family home after staying in the apartment addition they had built for him. Their two grandchildren live in Connecticut.

Marge works with the Foundation for Pancreatic Cancer Research and Treatment in memory of her sister. Her project is with the Ron Foley Foundation, "Ron's Rescue," where she assesses requests for assistance, makes recommendations to the allocation committee and directs funds to those approved for assistance. Grants awarded have built ramps, paid bills and covered travel costs for patients and families.

Bob says his current passions are golf and completing projects on their home. He hopes his "handyman" skills can be helpful for projects at All Faiths. And Marge would like to contribute to Unitarians honoring Jewish traditions.

September 2nd - This session will review our work in August as we delve deeper into our Unitarian Universalist seventh Principle. It instills respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part, and appreciation of its beauty, excitement, and mystery.

September 9th - This session studies the interdependent web through the lens of "habitat," an environment that supports the life needs of all the plants and creatures living in it. Children think about the many needs a habitat supplies. Through the story "Habitat at Home," children discover ways they can act in their own environment to help animal co-dwellers meet their basic life needs.

September 16th - This session introduces the mystery and wonder of life cycles through the concept of metamorphosis. This age group is fascinated by the "magic" that turns a caterpillar into a butterfly, or a tadpole into a frog. The central story, "A Caterpillar Grows Up," describes the awe and wonder one family feels when they watch the metamorphosis of a cabbage worm into a butterfly.

September 23rd - Children continue exploring circles of life by studying decomposition. The story, "And It Is Good," shows the important role decomposition plays in the cycle of life. The main activity is the creation of an Earthworm Wonderland.

September 30th - This session introduces the abundance and diversity of plants through the central story "Noah's Wife: The Story of Naamah." The children learn "The Garden Song" and plant seedlings to take home.
